Glossary	
Chanukah (Menorah)	A nine branched candle lit during the eight-day holiday of Hanukkah.
Mezuzah (plural, mezuzot)	A little square of parchment with the Shema prayer written on it. It is placed in a container and fixed on the doorpost of Jewish homes
Rabbi	A teacher of Jewish law.
Shabbat	The seventh day of the Jewish week, which is a day of rest and often used for prayer.
Synagogue	A Jewish place of worship.
Tenakah	Book of sacred Jewish text, consisting of the Torah, the Prophets and the Writing.
Torah	The sacred text of the Jewish people, who follow the religion of Judaism.
