The **Humanist** symbol is called the Happy Human. It was designed by Dennis Barrington who won a competition organised by the **BHA** in 1965. The symbol was chosen as the design was simple. The symbol shows a human, but it could have be either a male or female. Within a few years, this symbol became the international symbol of Humanism. The symbol is still used, in a range of adapted forms, in the present day.
